NOTICE REGARDING THE CALLING POST

When messages are called out using the Calling Post (i.e. notice of death or other community news), if you are unable to jot down the information, please DO NOT HANG UP at the end of the message. The messages will automatically repeat a number of times so you do have the time to search for paper and pen to take down the particular information.

Be Aware — Don't Be Fooled: The Grandparents Scam

Scammers will place a call to an older person, and when the mark picks up, they will say something along the lines of: "Hi Grandma, do you know who this is?" When the unsuspecting grandparent guesses the name of the grandchild the scammer most sounds like, the scammer has established a fake identity without having done a lick of background research.

The impostor will then claim to be in trouble and that he or she needs money for rent, bail or something of the like. Scammers will often ask for money to be sent to Western Union or by some other electronic method.

How to Avoid: If you receive a suspicious phone call from someone claiming to be a relative or loved one, say you'll call back, and check the story with other relatives. Note that these scammers can get information about you and your relatives off of social media sites like Facebook. Most scammers aren't this sophisticated, but the tactic is not unheard of, so don't be fooled if a suspicious caller references details from your life or a relative's.

Keeping It Safe




As winter continues through February and into March the potential for snow and ice remain. As you walk and drive around our community and the surrounding areas please take care to avoid slips and slides.

The Best Of Cook's Corner by Catherine Hannon

It's that time of year again. It's frigid and Cold outside. Time for a steaming hot bowl or cup of soup.

Quick Mushroom Barley Soup:

1Tbsp.olive oil.

1 cup sliced fresh mushrooms

½ cup chopped carrot

½ cup chopped onions

2 cups water

3/4 cup quick-cooking barley

2 Tbsp. all-purpose flour

3 cups whole milk

1 ½ tsp. salt

½ tsp. pepper

- 1. In a saucepan heat oil over medium heat. Add mushrooms, carrots and onion; cook and stir 5 minutes. Add water and barley. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat: simmer, uncovered, 12-15 minutes or until barley is tender.
- 2. In a small bowl, mix flour, milk, salt and pepper until smooth; stir into soup. Return to a boil, stirring constantly; cook and stir 1-2 minutes or until thickened.
- 3. Start to finish; 30 minutes. Makes 6 servings.

Bacon Potato Corn Chowder:

½ lb. bacon strips, chopped

½ cup chopped onion

1 ½ lbs. Yukon Gold potatoes (about 5 mediums), peeled and cubed

1 can (1 1/4 oz.) cream –style corn

1 can (12 oz.) evaporated milk

½ tsp. each salt and pepper

- 1. In a large skillet, cook bacon over medium heat until crisp, stirring occasionally. Remove with a slotted spoon; drain on paper towels. Discard drippings, reserving 1 ½ tsp. in pan. Add onion to drippings; cook and stir over medium-high heat until tender.
- 2. Place potatoes in a large saucepan; add water to cover. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat; cook, uncovered, 10-15 minutes or until tender. Drain, reserving 1 cup potato water.
- 3. Add corn, milk, salt, pepper and reserved potato water to saucepan; heat through. Stir in bacon and onion.
- 4. Start to finish 30 minutes. Makes 6 servings.

Weekday Beef Stew:

1 sheet frozen puff pastry, thawed

1 pkg. (15oz) refrigerated beef roast

2 cans (14 ½ oz. each) diced tomatoes, un-drained

1 pkg.(16oz.) frozen vegetables for stew

1/4 tsp. pepper

1Tbsp. cornstarch

1 1/4 cups water

- 1. Preheat oven to 400°. Unfold puff pastry. Using a 4-inch round cookie cutter, cut out four circles. Place 2 inches apart on a greased baking sheet. Bake pastry 14-16 minutes or until golden brown.
- 2. Meanwhile, shred beef with two forks: transfer to a large saucepan. Add tomatoes, vegetables and pepper; bring to a boil. In a small bowl, mix cornstarch and water until smooth: stir into beef mixture. Return to a boil, stirring constantly: cook and stir 1-2 minutes or until thickened.
- 3. Ladle stew into four bowls; top each with a pastry round.
- 4. Start to finish:30 minutes Makes 4 servings.

When it comes to soup, there are crackers and then there are cheesy croutons, roasted pumpkin seeds an dashes of spice to top your hot soups.

CREATURE FEATURE: Wild Turkey (Meleagris gallopavo) by Kimberly Stever

Wild Turkeys are native to New York and Long Island, but by the early 19th century they had been extirpated from the state, a consequence of habitat loss and overhunting. Turkeys were reintroduced on Long Island in the early 1990s by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation, who captured and relocated 75 Turkeys from upstate New York to several places on Long Island. This reintroduction was wildly successful and Turkeys are now a common sight throughout Suffolk County and the twin forks.

Wild Turkeys are predominantly brown, but their feathers have a green shine in the sunlight. Males (toms) can be identified by their fleshy gobble, spurs and beard, they are an imposing 2.5 feet tall and can weigh up to 25 lbs. Females are smaller, about half the weight of a typical male, and have rusty brown feathers and blue to white heads. Toms tend to have dark brown-black feathers with colorful red, white and blue heads and a red gobble. Males also have "spurs" a

sharp spike that grows from the rear of their legs, and "beards"

a long tail-like cluster of hairs (really an adapted feather) which grows from the center-front of their chest, beards can grow up to 10 inches long!

Turkeys prefer open forests with clearings, and are often found near or adjacent to farmland. These birds are omnivorous and their diet changes seasonally. Their ability to exploit many different food sources makes it easier for them to survive cold weather. In the warmer months they forage for insects, small reptiles, grasses, berries and seeds, and in late fall and winter rely on acorns, ferns, and mosses. Although turkeys are most often seen foraging and strutting on

the ground, they can and do fly, and may reach speeds of up to 55 mph in short bursts. Turkeys prefer to roost in trees at night, and often do so in groups. It's amazing to see a tree peppered with the silhouettes of such large birds!

Turkeys breed from April to June amidst a great commotion of courtship displays from the males. Toms strut, gobble and drag their wings on the ground to attract a partner, and will mate with multiple hens throughout the season. Hens nest alone in shallow depressions and typically lay about a dozen eggs over a 2 week period. Eggs hatch after incubating for approximately 28 days; hatchlings or poults quickly learn to feed on their own. Hens and chicks will immediately congregate to form large groups, but during the winter males also flock together. Large broods of up to 200 individuals have been recorded!

Did you know that Benjamin Franklin suggested the turkey as candidate for the National Bird, instead of the Bald Eagle? Stop by the Outdoor Wildlife Complex at the Refuge to see our beautiful female Turkey and Bald Eagle this holiday season!


