

Selling your Home?

Here are some results (based on the 7 responses I receive):

- 71% have contacted advertisers found in Fox Tales
- 100% read the Announcements Page, all but one (who abstained) said they found it helpful
- 57% enjoy the puzzles and all found the difficulty level just right
- 85% find the calendars helpful and all said they were legible
- One respondent suggested the following:



Happy New Year to all! I hope you enjoy the following recipes . Some old and some new for 2018!

An Old English dish, Welsh Rarebit.

Serves 4.


- 
- 2 tbsp unsalted butter
 - 1 medium shallot, finely chopped
 - 1 tbsp all purpose flour
 - 2 tsp dry mustard
 - 1/2 tsp black pepper
 - 10 oz aged cheddar cheese, shredded(3 1/4 cups)
 - 1/4 cup brown ale, such as Samuel Smith's
 - 1 tbsp Worcestershire sauce
 - Four 1/2 inch thick slices of country bread, toasted
 - 1 tbsp Chopped chives

1. In a medium saucepan , melt the butter. Add the shallot and cook over moderate heat, stirring occasionally, until softened (2-3 minutes.)
2. Whisk in the flour, dry mustard, and pepper, cook, stirring occasionally (1 minute.)
3. Add the cheese, ale and Worcestershire sauce and cook over low heat, whisking until the cheese melts (2-3 minutes.)
4. Preheat the broiler and position a rack 4 inches from the heat. Line a rimmed baking sheet with parchment paper and arrange the toast on top. Spoon the cheddar mixture over the toast and broil until bubbling and browned around the edges (about 2 minutes.)
5. Sprinkle with chives, and serve.

Put away the pot. These smart pastas are easier than boiling water!

One pan recipe for sweet and spicy mac & cheese, Pickled Pepper Macaroni and Cheese.

Serves 8

- 
- 3 tbsp unsalted butter melted, plus more for brushing
 - 4 cups half and half
 - 2 tbsp all purpose flour
 - 2 tsp kosher salt
 - 1 tsp pepper
 - 1 lb uncooked extra wide egg noodles
 - 2 cups shredded Fontina cheese
 - 2 cups shredded sharp white cheddar cheese
 - 1 cup chopped mixed hot and sweet pickled peppers, plus more for garnish
 - 1 cup panko

1. Preheat the oven to 425. Brush a 9 by 13 inch baking dish with butter.
2. In a medium bowl whisk the half-and-half with the flour, salt, pepper and 1 cup of water.
3. Stir in noodles, both cheeses, and the peppers. Scrape the noodle mixture into the prepared baking dish and bake until bubbling and the noodles are tender (about 30 minutes.)
4. Preheat the broiler and position a rack 8 inches from the heat. In a small bowl toss the panko with the 3 tablespoons of melted butter until evenly moistened. Sprinkle the panko mixture over the macaroni and cheese and broil until browned. (1 to 2 minutes.)
5. Garnish with peppers and serve.

Shortcut Baked Rigatoni with Meatballs.

Serves 6 to 8.

1/2 lb ground pork

1/2 lb ground beef

1/2 cup plain dry breadcrumbs

1/3 cup lightly packed torn basil, plus more for garnish

1/4 cup freshly grated Parmigiana-Reggiano cheese, plus more for garnish

2 large eggs, lightly beaten

Kosher salt and pepper

1 lb uncooked rigatoni

1 lb fresh mozzarella, torn into 1 -inch pieces

3 cups store bought marinara sauce

1. Preheat the oven to 400. In a large bowl combine the pork, beef, breadcrumbs, basil, cheese, eggs and 1 teaspoon each of salt and pepper, mix well.
2. Roll tablespoonfuls of the mixture between wet palms to form 30 meatballs.
3. In a 9 by 13 inch ceramic baking dish spread half of the pasta in an even layer. Arrange half of the meatballs and mozzarella over the pasta.
4. Spoon half of the marinara sauce on top and season with 1/2 teaspoon of salt. Repeat with the remaining pasta, meatballs, mozzarella, sauce and 1/2 teaspoon of salt.
5. Add 2 1/2 cups of water to the dish and cover tightly with foil.
6. Bake until the pasta is tender and most of the liquid is absorbed (about 1 hour.)
7. Uncover and bake for 5 more minutes.
8. Turn on the broiler and broil 8 inches from the heat until top is lightly browned.
9. Let stand for 5 minutes and then garnish the baked pasta with basil and cheese and serve.

Tip you can use other pasta shapes, such as longer, thinner ziti sheets, curly rotini, or fusilli.

Enjoy and have fun making new dishes!





A Brief History of the Big Duck




Owner Martin Maurer had The Big Duck building constructed in 1930 and 1931 on a prime spot on the busy Main Street in the town of Riverhead. In 1937, he moved the building four miles southeast to Flanders, where it occupied a prominent location near the duck barns and marshes of Maurer's new duck ranch. The entire area, including Flanders and Riverhead, was the center of Long Island's well-known duck-farming industry. By 1939 there were about 90 duck farms in Suffolk County.

The Big Duck's unusual building and prime location helped garner much customer attention until it closed in 1984. In 1988, Suffolk County acquired The Big Duck and moved it to Route 24 on the edge of Sears-Bellows Pond County Park between Flanders and Hampton Bays. The building houses a gift shop operated by the Friends for Long Island Heritage. In 2004, there was a movement to relocate the duck to Long Island MacArthur Airport, but the duck was returned to its Flanders location on October 6, 2007. Suffolk County continues to own it, maintains its interior and pays for staffing; Southampton Town maintains the exterior. The original 27-acre duck farm was purchased by the town in 2006.

During a short period, Long Island singer/songwriter Billy Joel and his then wife Christie Brinkley lived inside the duck while Brinkley lent her voice to a tape greeting for visitors.

Since around 1988 the Big Duck has been lit up with Christmas lights placed along a giant wreath which hangs around the duck's neck. Every year around Christmas time a "Duck" lighting ceremony is held.

A Brief History of Christmas Carols

Carols were first sung in Europe thousands of years ago, but these were not Christmas Carols. They were pagan songs, sung at the Winter Solstice celebrations as people danced round stone circles. The word Carol actually means dance or a song of praise and joy! Carols used to be written and sung during all four seasons, but only the tradition of singing them at Christmas has really survived.

Early Christians took over the pagan solstice celebrations for Christmas and gave people Christian songs to sing instead of pagan ones. In 129, a Roman Bishop said that a song called "Angel's Hymn" should be sung at a Christmas service in Rome. In 1223 St. Francis of Assisi started his Nativity Plays in Italy. The people in the plays sang songs or 'canticles' that told the story during the plays. Sometimes the people watching the play would join in! The new carols spread to France, Spain, Germany and other European countries.



